Christ Is Not Jesus's Last Name

This chapter title borrowed from Rohr's <u>The Universal Christ</u> is well represented in this Sunday's Gospel reading. John the Baptist's words in this Sunday's Gospel reading. "A man who comes after me has surpassed me because he was before me" clearly refers to the eternal universal Christ called logos, (the word, wisdom or the rational principle) appearing in the opening lines of John's Gospel. Following this opening in verse 14 the Gospel reads: "The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us. We have seen his glory, the glory of the one and only Son, who came from the Father, full of grace and truth."

John's Jewish mystical tradition sets out to describe the mystical relationship between the historical person Jesus who was born and died on the cross and the universal eternal Christ. In the fourth gospel we have the words of the Christ and in a rare case in this gospel the words of the historical Jesus.

In this brief reflection I would like to bring your attention to the identity the relationship between the Christ and truth. Not only is the eternal Christ the word and full of truth(1:14) but in Chapter 14 we have Christ declaring "I am the way the truth and the light." We participate in Christ when we seek the truth. Christ is also the light, (our internal wisdom) that reveals the truth. Recently award winning Journalist Chris Hedges was honoured with an Award from a theological institution. The speaker presenting the award quoted Latin American theologian Jon Sobrino as saying the responsibility of the theologian is to encourage honesty with respect to our beliefs about reality. Chris Hedges was held as a prime example of a theologian taking on this responsibility. The truth is not always what we believe it to be. Some times the truth is hard to accept. Christ is the light (wisdom) inside us that reveals the truth. The truth comes to us through our inner light and not from what the authorities tell us.

"Many people only want the truth if it makes them feel more stable, feel more in control and feel good. This means that many of us have a very conditional relationship with truth" (Teal Swan). Perhaps we can say the same about our relationship with the Christ.
