
The Halberty/Martel Family

n December 2nd, Mary Lou and I celebrated our 57th wedding anniversary. We found it intriguing that at the same time there was much in the news about Notre-Dame Cathedral in Paris and how its official reopening was near, following five years of restoration after the fire. In October of 1966, when I was about six weeks into my sojourn at L'Arche in France, and Mary Lou was in her first weeks of living au-pair in Paris, we met in Paris and spent most of a day at Notre-Dame, looking around and admiring the amazing sculptures and artwork. Our romance began there, to be followed by more than a half century of life together, so we have enjoyed watching the news reports about the renewed Notre-Dame, with its stonework now restored to a gleaming white. We love the place and hold close those memories.



Speaking of anniversaries, November 24th was the second anniversary of Mary Lou leaving our apartment to go to hospital, never to return home. After a few weeks at St. Michael's, and then at Providence Health Care, she moved to her current long-term care home, True Davidson Acres, in January of 2023. We spend part of each day together, but it's hard to be living apart.

About 3½ years ago we acquired a used wheel chair van, thanks to L'Arche Toronto, which facilitated transporting Mary Lou to various places in her wheelchair. A couple of months ago, I replaced that van with another used wheelchair van (in better condition). Having this special transportation means that I can bring Mary Lou to various events, including dinners and family gettogethers. There are limitations, due to Mary Lou's need for full physical nursing care, which means that longer trips, such as going to our summer place in Flinton, are not possible for her, which causes her grief.

I also experience grief, and although I spent a few days at "The River" with the family at the beginning and end of the summer, which was good, I still felt the sadness of missing Mary Lou's presence there.

Over the years, in saying goodnight to the children or grandchildren, I have often tossed out the little rhyme: "Good night, sleep tight, don't let the bedbugs bite. If they do take a shoe, and hit them 'till they're black and blue." The verse came back to bite me - literally. In early May, the housekeeper discovered bedbugs in my apartment, which must have migrated in from some other part of the apartment building. It was 6 months later -November 8th – that my apartment was eventually declared "clear" of bugs.



In between there was a lot of upheaval – emptying drawers, shelves and cupboards; doing tons of laundry; having linens and clothing heat-treated; having the apartment treated by a pest control company several times (at the expense of Chartwell); living in the middle of what could be described as a "storage unit", with the apartment full of plastic bins holding my belongings; etc. I'm grateful it's over, and I'm working at restoring the apartment to normal order.

In her piece for the Newsletter, Mary Lou mentions that a number of our friends have died over the past year. Ian Squires died in April, in Renfrew, Ontario.Peter and Colette drove me up to Arnprior for his funeral service, at which I was asked to deliver a eulogy.Ian was the first person to join Mary Lou and I at the farm when we started L'Arche Frontenac (now L'Arche Arnprior), in 1975, and he was thus a co-founder of the community.

Other L'Arche people died during the year: Maurice Charbonneau, who with his wife Mary had founded L'Arche Ottawa, and whose family were so close to our family over the years; Pat Lenon, who with his wife Jo was a central figure in L'Arche in Alberta; John Bloss and Gordie Henry, who were early and central Core Members of L'Arche Daybreak in Richmond Hill.

Mary Lou turned 80, in June, and I had my 82nd birthday in August, so we are now both members of the "Octogenarian Club" – sort of hard to believe, but also something for which to be grateful. And we're also grateful for all the good gifts we have received in our lives, including the love and support of our large family and of our friends. We send all of you our love for this special season of Christmas, and we wish you all a wonderful New Year.


